Blessed it is to forget oneself

For many years, there has been a great focus on self-development, being your best and most perfect self.

But now, fortunately, more and more people are realizing that the first step in developing oneself is to forget oneself. Psychologist Svend Brinkmann has argued that we don't actual- must admit there are deep ly need self-development, but self-dismantling, because true presence is self-forgetfulness.

I recently came across the same wisdom in one of H.C. Andersen's fairy tales. The Teapot.

The story is about a teapot that is very proud.

It is the most important part of the tea set, which is a very fine set, so it considers itself to be exceedingly distinguished. But then it starts to get damaged – a and what can be so difficult: chip breaks off the spout, and later part of the handle breaks as well, and the teapot is put away on a shelf. Eventually, it is given to a woman who begs for cooking fat. She uses it as a flowerpot and fills it with soil - which, for a teapot, is like death.

But in the soil she places a flower bulb, and the bulb sprouts, and it grows, and the teapot says:

"The bulb sprouted, I saw it, I forgot myself in its beauty blessed is it to forget oneself in others."

I remember hearing that little tale when I was a child. I probably didn't understand much of it back then, but reading it now as an adult, I layers in it, new realizations.

It's truly a story about gaining life when you feel like vou've lost it and about finding joy in self-forgetfulness by watching something outside vourself blossom.

Out of the breakdown. something wonderful grows - something one could never have dreamed of. That is, in a way, what we are also meant to understand in Christianity. that the one who loses their life will find it. We do not create the meaning of our lives ourselves - we receive it from others. The little flower bulb becomes the very heart of the teapot, beating and keeping it alive. And even when the teapot is eventually shattered, it still holds the memory of that joyful self-forgetfulness that arises when it becomes absorbed in something outside of itself.

And strikingly, it's not until the teapot has been broken by life that it gains these insights. When it stood on the tea table, flaunting its Chinese tea leaves, it only thought: "Damn, I'm good."

In that situation, there's not much self-awareness. But sometimes - if not often - self-awareness comes through adversity. It is a valuable realization to make: that one can become happy by forgetting oneself in others, as H.C. Andersen so movingly describes in the tale of The Teapot.

So let us plant flower bulbs.

The Federation of Danish Associations in Canada is holding its **44th Annual Conference and AGM** in Calgary this year. The conference takes place from May 22 to 25 and is hosted by the Sharon Danish Lutheran Church. In addition to the Conference, the Federation is also holding its **Annual Heritage Seminar (Højskole)** also in Calgary from May 26 to 30. The theme will be "Exploring Southern Alberta".

Notes from DLC AGM

We had a very good meeting at our AGM on Sunday April 6, 2025 with almost 50 members participating either in person or via Zoom. Thank you for taking part in this important meeting.

We heard reports from President Sune Overgaard and Pastor Kirstine Rasmussen, after which we reviewed the financial statements from last year, and the proposed budgets for this year, all of which received unanimous approval from the members. We heard reports from the activity groups, and the Board members, whose term was up and who had all agreed to stand for re-election were acclaimed for another two-year term. The Norgaard Trust is now accepting grant applications. Forms are available at the church or on the website.

Our Director of Outreach, Susanne Truelsen, reported that the board has held a couple of planning meetings with a view to determining how best to prepare the organization for future sustainability with respect to values, participation, volunteering, and financial support. We need to think outside the box to make significant changes to ensure that we do

have a future – and this needs to be done now. This includes looking at a new mission statement, seeking expert advice with regards to funding and potential business development, recruitment of volunteers, and community involvement. To help us in determining the who, what, when, and where – we will soon be sending out a Community Engagement Survey seeking your responses to these questions. The survey will be anonymous, and replies are not due until September – so please take your time and tell us what you think.

We will have results ready to share later in the year. Our focus will be to have concrete plans ready and on a roll in time for a big celebration of our 70th anniversary in 2027. We will be looking for video interviews, stories in our newsletter, fundraising events – anything to help make our future bright and strong, and worthy of a proud celebration.

My Canadian Adventure

I've always dreamt of going overseas. At first, it was to experience the big U.S.A. in the south. But then I noticed another country—almost as big as the States, just a bit further north: Canada. "Exciting," I thought. It was a country I knew existed but surprisingly knew very little about. The more I read about it, the more intrigued I became, and it didn't take long for me to decide that this was the destination I wanted to go to.

When I arrived, one of the first things that fascinated me was the fact that signs, announcements, and messages were in both English and French. One day, at a Walmart, I picked up a Harry Potter DVD. It said "Harry Potter and the Chamber of Secrets," and a little further down on the cover, "Harry Potter à l'école des sorciers."

Little by little, it became clear that Canada's culture is a mix of almost every culture. As I began to understand this, I wondered, "Can it even be one land with one culture when

you embrace so many different ones in one place?" For example, in kindergarten, they celebrate Ramadan, Christmas, Chinese New Year, and Diwali. And in winter, they don't call it a "Christmas market," but a "Winter market."

But I've learned that it is very much a culture—and one country—indeed. One that welcomes all cultures to create one united land. It shows that even if you believe in one religion, come from a certain tradition, and have a family from one country, your best friend can come from completely different ones.

In a global society with so many different religions, cultures, and countries—with a lot of conflict, and sometimes a growing feeling of division and alienation—maybe Canada's wish to welcome everyone and build a united culture from many is a template the rest of the world could look at and learn from.
